Daughters of Utah Pioneers News and History

The Canal Creek Camp of the Daughters of Utah Pioneers will have their first meeting of the new year on January 6 at 11:00 a.m. in the ballroom of the Old School Community Center. The lesson will be "Santa Clara, Utah" given by Pat Ellsworth. The pioneer history will be given by Kristine Hansen. Our next meeting will be February 3.

The old school houses the city offices and also the DUP museum. We love being able to have our monthly meetings in the old building so beautifully restored. This old elementary school, built in 1899, had four classrooms on each floor to accommodate grades one through eight. (The attic was not accessible.) When Ethel Blaine (Larson) first began teaching around 1906, she received \$35 a month and taught 72 children. The next year, she received \$50 and only had 53 students in her first grade class!

About 1912, the older students began attending Mt. Pleasant's new high school. They were transported by

team and wagon or sleigh, with Joe Schofield's Livery furnishing most of the transportation. A covered wagon complete with stove was sometimes used in very cold weather before the earliest buses.

Joseph Schofield operated the town's only livery stable. He transported passengers to Spring City from the train west of town for 25 cents. He also took passengers to Mt. Pleasant from where they could take the stage. Not only did Joe have one of the earliest telephones in town, by 1916 he had also switched most of his horse-drawn livery services to an auto-based operation for local townsfolk and visitors.

Schofield's Livery Service was a Spring City institution for many years. The Schofield home on Main Street was recently restored. It is located just north of the Baxter and Blain Merc, aka the Schofield Store with the Squirt mural on the side. The Sorensen Brough Blacksmith Shop was conveniently located to the east of the Livery.
