DUP News and History by Cherrie Barrow Jones

The Canal Creek Camp of the Daughters of Utah Pioneers will meet April 7 in the ballroom at the Old School Community Center. The lesson will be "The History of Box Elder County," and the pioneer history will be given by Norma Crisp. We look forward to seeing you there. The next meeting will be held May 5.

Traditionally, the founding of Spring City was celebrated in March. When James Allred and his family arrived in Utah in the fall of 1851, the little village of Manti was the only Sanpete settlement, having been settled in November 1849. President Young suggested James select a place for this record of Spring City.

1852, James Allred, his wife Elizabeth, their family and a few others settled along "Canal Creek." There were troubles with the Ute warriors raiding, so their numbers were bolstered by about 50 Danish families in the fall of 1853.

We are fortunate that the history of Spring City was researched and recorded in the book *Life Under the Horse-shoe*, edited by Kaye Watson. The book was undertaken by the Daughters of Utah Pioneers as a fundraising effort to restore the old 1899 Elementary School. Many in the community contributed information, histories and photos for this record of Spring City.

Planning and Zoning Commission News

Community Wild Fire Council by Jane Hawkes

Thanks to Mindy Hardy, the Fire Department, and Spring needed. Gloves and sturdy shoes also are advised. Youth City Citizen Corps, we again have our own local Community Wildfire Council (CWC). We provide Wildfire Risk Assessment, Education and Outreach, and help in preparing for wildfire emergencies, including mitigation in managing vegetation. Why are we concerned? In 2024 there were 64,897 wildfires in the US, which was higher than the 5-year and 10-year averages.

This spring we are having both a May Day activity and a Clean-up Contest to help us be aware and prepare.

The May Day activity will be held May 3 from 9 a.m. to noon at the Activity Center, 150 East Center. Citizens need to come there at 9 a.m. for instruction, tours of fire trucks, and service project sign-ups. The service projects include clearing away weeds growing around fire hydrants and utility poles in our area so that the weeds don't hinder their use or even create fire hazards. For the projects, hoes, rakes, clippers, and wheelbarrows are

groups are especially needed. An ice cream social will be held at the end of the event

The Clean-Up Contest will be for families to become active in freeing up the fire hazard debris around their homes with "before" and "after" pictures of their efforts. This clean-up can be started any time before or on May 3 by contacting Jane Hawkes at 707-673-7548 to sign up and get details. The home clean-ups will need to be finished by May 17. There will be prizes for the four best clean-ups. Prizes will be contributed by Horseshoe Mountain Hardware, Tractor Supply, and Terrel's

On May 3, large bins will be on the east and west sides of town for yard debris only. Limbs and large branches are to be taken to the east of town, at the intersection of Center Street and 700 East, near the sheep pens, for the city to chip.

Notice of Municipal Election

The following positions are to be voted upon in the Spring City 2025 Municipal Election.

- Council Seat At-Large, four-year term.
- Council Seat At-Large, four-year term.
- Council Seat At-Large, two-year term.
- Mayor Seat, four-year term.

Those Considering declaring candidacy for elected office must be;

- A registered voter;
- A resident of the municipality (Spring City) for a period of 12 consecutive months immediately before the date of election;
- Maintain a principal place of residence within the district that the elected officer represents, during the officer's term of office;
- Not be convicted of a felony, convicted of treason or a crime against the elective franchise, unless their right to hold elective office has been restored;
- Cannot have been declared mentally incompetent.

Candidate filing begins June 2, 2025, and ends June 6, 2025.

A Declaration of Candidacy must be filed in person at the Spring City Office located at 45 South 100 East between the hours of 9:00 to 5:00 Monday through Friday. Please note that the City office hours are 9:00 to 4:00 Monday through Thursday. If you are unable to come during office hours please call Ruth Ann McCain, the elections officer, at 281-841-3135 to make arrangements.

Primary Election: August 12, 2025.

General Election: November 4, 2025

Voter Registration

The requirements to become a registered voter are:

- Citizen of the United States:
- Resident of Utah for at least 30 days immediately before the election;
- At least 18 years old on the day of election;
- At least 17 years old for some Primary Elections if you will be 18 prior to the associated General Election
- Reside in the voting district or precinct in which the person applies to register to vote.


