Mayor's Corner by Chris Anderson

On the evening of February 27, Spring City hosted a public meeting to introduce the initial project plans developed to take advantage of a grant obtained by the city during Mayor Cynthia DeGrey's administration. You are welcome to submit comments about the project by sending an email to springcity@utwatershed.com, or dropping them off at City Hall, any time before March 28.

By way of background, the grant was obtained through the Natural Resources Conservation Service's (NRCS) Watershed Protection and Flood Protection Program. The project is intended primarily to prevent flooding during peak runoff events and conserve water by reducing water losses and inefficiencies in the agricultural water delivery system. Some recreational opportunities may also be considered in connection with the project.

The major components intended to be developed are:

- (1) the construction of the Freeman Allred Reservoir northeast of town, to hold flood waters when the need arises, and facilitate agricultural water management;
- (2) creation of some concrete water diversion channels, piping some open ditches and cleaning out other ditches to minimize water loss and improve delivery systems (note that the main ditch through town will be cleaned out but remain open, in recognition of citizen preferences); and
- (3) replacement of the aging penstock pipeline that provides water to Spring City's hydroelectric system.

As the environmental assessment activities are completed, the project will proceed to the detailed planning phase, then hopefully move on to construction (which may be phased for different aspects of the project).

Scholarship Opportunities for High School Seniors

Utah Associated Municipal Power Systems (UAMPS) will be awarding eight \$2,500 scholarships in 2025 to high school seniors who demonstrate interest in an educational path that will align with the goal of creating affordable and sustainable energy. These scholarships can be used at a two-year or four-year post-secondary institution or educational program.

Applicants must have a 3.0 GPA, be a US citizen, and reside in a household within a UAMPS member community or in a household whose electricity is serviced by a UAMPS member.

We honor the lives of the pioneers by sharing a pioneer history when we meet. One of the purposes of the Daughters of Utah Pioneers is to collect and preserve these histories. The history of Ethel Geniel Sorenson Luckau was recorded in 1965. Ethel was the daughter of Ferdinand C. Sorenson and Maria Larsen.

Being of Scandinavian heritage, her family located their farm in the northeast part of Spring City, where most of the Danish population lived. The Sorenson family lived in a log home where the children shared one bedroom. It seemed quite a distance to the main part of town. Later, Ethel recorded, her "father built two new rooms to the north, brick rooms, and our windows facing the west-there was two windows facing the west--and a door to the west in the dining room. It was a log room with real wide window sills, and we used to have geraniums in the win-

The Canal Creek Camp of the Daughters of Utah Pioneers dows most of the time. It was heated with a coal stove and a heater in the one room, and of course the kitchen range out in the kitchen. The lighting in the early part was with lamp, coal-oil lamps. I used to be the one that should clean the chimneys.

> "We had just enough [furniture] to get along with. When we got our first phonograph that played the cylinder records, it was such a thrill that it made us cry, and we appreciated it very much. I remember at house cleaning time when we used to have to take the carpet up and sweep all the old straw out from under it and take the carpet out on the line and beat it, and beat the dust out of it. Then we would sprinkle new straw on the cleanly scrubbed floor, which my mother would do. We'd put new straw down and then tack the carpet back down. Then we rubbed all the furniture off with coal oil to clean and polish it.

> "I never learned to swim, but I did learn to roller skate and ice skate. We went up on a pond up east--three blocks east of our place in the winter, and I tied on some old ice skates that was my father's and sat on the bank of the pond and just stepped right off onto the ice and went skating..."
