Why We Need Adequate Notice for Senior Dinners.

We appreciate our wonderful cook, Abby Bracken, very much. She spends hours planning, shopping, and preparing our monthly meal. These meals always taste and look great! At this last senior dinner there were 60 reservations, and Abby was very happy that so many of you are enjoying getting together. Of the 60 meals, only three take-home dinners were ordered.

However, at the last dinner at least two people did not show up at all, and I was informed by several that they needed a take-out for their spouse or friend who was going to attend but then could not come. As a result, there were **eight**, not three, take-outs. This is a seemingly simple task to accomplish, but because Abby works alone in the kitchen, things can be a little harried as she keeps our food coming while also filling the take-outs for differing departure times. You can see why we need adequate no-

tice in order to have take-out meals prepared.

New Rules for Senior Dinners. Fortunately, we are subsidized a bit from the Spring City coffers so that we can charge the public a low price per plate. However, food prices have gone up since Abby started cooking for us, and we do not want her to be short on money. Therefore, we are applying the following rules:

- * We will be charging \$7 per plate going forward.
- * We would like 1 or 2 volunteer dessert servers who would also be “on call” for helping in the kitchen *during* the meal, if needed. (Call Jane at 707-673-7548 if you are interested.)
- * ***I MUST know by Monday NOON*** before the Wednesday dinner if you plan to come and how many are in your party. I must also know how many want takeouts. The reason is so that Abby can adequately shop for us, which she does Monday *afternoon*.
- * If you say you are coming and ***do not show up***, you still need to pay for any plates of food ordered because we pay Abby based on the number I tell her on Monday ***at 1:00 pm***.

Planning and Zoning Commission News

The Planning and Zoning Commission had a very busy meeting this month. We approved the minutes from November and December 2025. One license permit was approved for an Airbnb on Center Street. Four subdivisions were reviewed and approved. One discussion was held regarding an 8-acre parcel in the buffer zone. We ap-

proved a simplified zoning permit form for minor structures in the city. The Historic Preservation Subcommittee report was given. We are always grateful for those who attend the meeting to support our commission’s efforts to serve the city.

DUP News and History by Cherrie Jones

The Canal Creek Camp of the Daughters of Utah Pioneers will meet Monday, February 2, at 11:00 a.m. in the ballroom of the Old School Community Center. Our lesson will be “Daniel Webster Jones” given by Cynthia DeGrey. The pioneer history will be given by Barbara Chapman.

Daughters are descendants of any age of anyone who arrived in or passed through the Utah Territory between 1847, when the first pioneers arrived, through 1869, when the railroad was completed. At that time, the Utah Territory included all of present-day Utah, most of Nevada, much of Colorado and the southwest corner of Wyoming. However, you don’t need to be a descendant of one of those early pioneers in order to be part of DUP. All are welcome to meet with us.

We love to see the care given to our historic town, and the Brough home has been receiving some of that. The Brough family moved to Spring City in 1860 when Moroni was just a boy. He married Mary Crawforth and they

first lived for eight years near her father’s rock home south of town, where he farmed and raised sheep.

Moroni was very devoted to his dear wife, who suffered with ill health for years as a result of contracting scarlet fever at age 17. He was known as a hard-working man, a kind father, and a generous-hearted friend. Although Mary suffered from the effects of scarlet fever, she did all her own work—washing, sewing, housekeeping, gardening, and work about the home. She was known as a splendid mother and homemaker. Moroni and Mary were both known for their readiness to help anyone in need. (See their histories written by a daughter, Grace Brough Allred. Histories are kept in the Old City Hall Museum.)

The couple seem to have been true sweethearts. After the new school was built in 1899, they decided to move into town and build a home so they could be nearer to the school. Their home was built in 1909 and is located at 383 S 100 E.
